Introduction

This evening our Lenten observance comes to an end, and we gather with Christians around the world to celebrate the Three Days of Jesus' death and resurrection. Tonight we remember Christ's last meal with his disciples, and the central focus of his commandment that we live out the promise embodied in this meal. As Jesus washed his disciples' feet, so we are called to give and receive love in humble service to one another. Formed into a new body in Christ through this holy meal, we are transformed by God's mercy. We end the worship in silence as we await the coming days.

Confession and Forgiveness

Friends in Christ, in this Lenten season we have heard our Lord's call to struggle against sin, death, and the devil—all that keeps us from loving God and each other. This is the struggle to which we were called at baptism. Within the community of the church, God never wearies of forgiving sin and giving the peace of reconciliation. On this night let us confess our sin against God and our neighbor, and enter the celebration of the great Three Days reconciled with God and with one another.

Silence is kept for reflection and self-examination.

We have not loved you with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves.

Forgive us, renew us, and lead us, so that we may delight in your will and walk in your ways, to the glory of your holy name. Amen.

P God, who is rich in mercy, loved us even when we were dead in sin, and made us alive together with Christ.
By grace you have been saved.
In the name of + Jesus Christ, your sins are forgiven.
Almighty God strengthen you with power through the Holy Spirit, that Christ may live in your hearts through faith.

 Where impossibilities close every door and window, grant imagination and resistance
 Where distrust twists our thinking, grant healing and illumination.
 Where spirits are daunted and weakened, grant soaring wings and strengthened dreams
 All these things we ask in the name of Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord.

Concluding Prayer

P We pray to you, almighty God, in this time of pandemic. You are our refuge and our strength, a very present help in time of trouble. Do not let us fail in the face of this sickness. Uphold us with your love, and give us the strength we need. Help us in our confusion and anxiousness. Heal the sick, console the bereaved, protect the innocent and deliver any who are still in peril; for the sake of your great mercy in Jesus Christ our Lord.

The service concludes with the chanting of Psalm 22 while the worship space is stripped of all sacred icons.

If you wish to replicate this tradition:

Gather any faith related items you have in your home – icons, statues, crosses, religious symbols and art that can easily be removed. Pack them away in a bag or bin, cover large items with a cloth.

Remove all items from your table so it is completely empty and thoroughly wash it so it is both cleared and clean. Leave your table bare until Easter morning when you unpack and uncover your religious items and decorate your room table with Easter joy.
