Amen.


Ruth C. Duck translated Psalm 98 from the original Hebrew for a class in which she was learning that ancient biblical language; she later adapted the psalm in a metrical paraphrase. The text spoke to her of hope in God's justice. Ruth Duck is an ordained minister of the United Church of Christ, and she served on the hymnal committee for the Disciples of Christ's Chalice Hymnal (1995). Thomas Haweis wrote the tune RICHMOND in 1792. It was named for a friend, Leigh Richmond, who was rector at Bedfordshire Chapel in Bath, England. Haweis served as chaplain to Selina, Countess of Huntingdon, who owned the chapel. Haweis served churches in Oxford and Aldwinkle. Northamptonshire, England, before becoming manager of Countess Selina's chapels.

Sing aloud, O daughter Zion; shout, O Israel! Rejoice and exult with all your heart, O daughter Jerusalem! The Lord has taken away the judgments against you; he has turned away your enemies. The king of Israel, the Lord, is in your midst; you shall fear disaster no more.

John the Baptist heralds the mighty one who is coming. John teaches that preparation for God's reign is not a matter of identity but of bearing fruits of merciful justice, radical generosity, and vocational integrity. El Santo Evangelio según Lucas, capítulo tres.

Glory to you, O Lord. (¡Gloria a ti, oh Señor!)

John said to the crowds coming out to be baptized by him, "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the coming wrath? Therefore, bear fruits worthy of repentance, and do not begin to say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our ancestor,' for I tell you, God is able from these stones to raise up children to Abraham. Even now the ax is lying at the root of the trees; therefore every tree that does not bear good fruit will be cut down and thrown into the fire."

And the crowds asked him, "What, then, should we do?" In reply he said to them, "Whoever has two coats must share with anyone who has none, and whoever has food must do likewise." Even tax collectors came to be baptized, and they asked him, "Teacher, what should we do?" He said to them, "Collect no more than the amount prescribed for you." Soldiers also asked him, "And we, what should we do?" He said to them, "Do not extort money from anyone by threats or false accusation, and be satisfied with your wages."

As the people were filled with expectation and all were questioning in their hearts concerning John, whether he might be the Messiah, John answered all of them by saying, "I baptize you with water, but one who is more powerful than I is coming; I am not worthy to untie the strap of his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing fork is in his hand to clear his threshing floor and to gather the wheat into his granary, but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire."

So with many other exhortations he proclaimed the good news to the people.

THE HOMILY PASTOR DOROTHY

The assembly stands.

Charles Coffin wrote this text in Latin for the Paris Breviary, published in 1736. All six of the original stanzas are provided here in a new translation. Coffin served as rector at the University of Paris and later as principal of the College at Beauvais. He is one of only a few French poets and Roman Catholic clerics whose hymns have been used in English Protestant churches. This is perhaps the most widely sung of his more than 100 hymns. The tune PUER NOBIS NASCITUR was adapted to this form by Michael Praetorius in a 1609 collection of Protestant choral music.

Both of those factors highly influenced my experience in and contributions to the Baptist churches I served. I loved teaching the significance of the Christian year in a denomination that traditionally didn't follow it, because it had tremendous impact on people who were intentionally living their faith and hadn't been exposed to Christian seasons outside of Christmas and Easter. The season of Advent holds special importance to me as the anticipation of a new beginning, so I suppose it's no accident my first hymn would be

an Advent hymn!"






