## Sunday, December 21, 2025 • Fourth Sunday of Advent

Today Isaiah prophesies that a young woman will bear a son and name him Emmanuel. The gospel is Matthew's account of the annunciation and birth of the one named Emmanuel, God-with-us. During these final days of Advent we pray, "O come, O come, Emmanuel," a beloved hymn based on the O Antiphons, ancient prayers appointed for the seven days preceding Christmas. On this final Sunday of Advent we prepare to celebrate the birth of the one born to save us from the power of sin and death.


Long-expected God,

The Latin hymn may date to the ninth century or earlier. John Mason Neale (1818-1866), a noted hymnologist who rendered many early Christian hymns into English, created an English version from seven great antiphons salutina the Messiah with many symbolic names. This version has been extensively recast in order to emphasize the hymn's mystical imagery. Thomas Helmore (1811-1890), musical editor of The Hymnal Noted, 1854, provided this tune for Neale's translation of the Latin hymn. The plainsong source is a 15th-century Franciscan processional.









# **WORD**

**READING** ISAIAH 7:10-16

A reading from the prophet Isaiah, the seventh chapter.

An Israelite and Aramean military coalition presented a serious threat to King Ahaz of Judah. In response, Ahaz decided to secure his throne and kingdom by seeking Assyrian help. Isaiah reminds Ahaz that human attempts to establish security will fail. The prophet gives the sign that is the only source of true safety: Immanuel, God is with us!

Again the Lord spoke to Ahaz, saying, "Ask a sign of the Lord your God; let it be deep as Sheol or high as heaven." But Ahaz said, "I will not ask, and I will not put the Lord to the test." Then Isaiah said, "Hear then, O house of David! Is it too little for you to weary mortals that you weary my God also? Therefore the Lord himself will give you a sign. Look, the young woman is with child and shall bear a son and shall name him Immanuel. He shall eat curds and honey by the time he knows how to refuse the evil and choose the good. For before the child knows how to refuse the evil and choose the good, the land before whose two kings you are in dread will be deserted.

THE MAGNIFICAT LUKE 1:46B-55

In Mary's song of praise we hear of a saving God who remembers, scatters, lifts up, and fulfills all things. Listen to the words of Mary from the gospel according to Luke.

"My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit rejoices in God my Savior, for he has looked with favor on the lowly state of his servant. Surely from now on all generations will call me blessed, for the Mighty One has done great things for me, and holy is his name; indeed, his mercy is for those who fear him from generation to generation. He has shown strength with his arm; he has scattered the proud in the imagination of their hearts. He has brought down the powerful from their thrones and lifted up the lowly; he has filled the hungry with good things and sent the rich away empty. He has come to the aid of his child Israel, in remembrance of his mercy, according to the promise he made to our ancestors, to Abraham and to his descendants forever."

And Mary remained with her about three months and then returned to her home.

**READING** ROMANS 1:1-7

Most of the Christians in Rome do not know Paul. In this letter's opening he introduces himself as an apostle divinely appointed to spread God's gospel. The gospel's content is the promised coming of Christ, and Paul's mission is to bring about the obedience of faith among all nations, including his Roman audience. A reading from the letter of Paul to the Romans, the first chapter.

Paul, a servant of Christ Jesus, called to be an apostle, set apart for the gospel of God, which he promised beforehand through his prophets in the holy scriptures, the gospel concerning his Son, who was descended from David according to the flesh and was declared to be Son of God with power according to the spirit of holiness by resurrection from the dead, Jesus Christ our Lord, through whom we have received grace and apostleship to bring about the obedience of faith among all the gentiles for the sake of his name, including you who are called to belong to Jesus Christ,

To all God's beloved in Rome, who are called to be saints:

Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.



Now the birth of Jesus the Messiah took place in this way. When his mother Mary had been engaged to Joseph, but before they lived together, she was found to be pregnant from the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a righteous man and unwilling to expose her to public disgrace, planned to divorce her quietly. But just when he had resolved to do this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife, for the child conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will bear a son, and you are to name him Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins." All this took place to fulfill what had been spoken by the Lord through the prophet:

"Look, the virgin shall become pregnant and give birth to a son, and they shall name him Emmanuel,"

which means, "God is with us." When Joseph awoke from sleep, he did as the angel of the Lord commanded him; he took her as his wife but had no marital relations with her until she had given birth to a son, and he named him Jesus.



Carol Birkland (b. 1946) wrote this paraphrase of a 15thcentury German carol to make the words more accessible to today's generation. In other translations, the text consists of Mary's words to Joseph. The paraphrase altered this style to make the words a dialogue between the couple. The tune JOSEPH LIEBER, JOSEPH MEIN takes its title from the German text with which it was traditionally sung. In its original form, it was sung as a lullaby around the manger as part of a medieval Nativity mystery play held in the church. Mystery plays were like little operas that brought biblical stores to life.

#### THE APOSTLES' CREED

Author Ann Bell Worley writes: "God Almighty, We Are Waiting" was my first hymn. It started with the first line in my head during the season of Advent. *I remember writing down* that first line and keeping a notebook by my bedside that evening, tossing and turning, and writing a line at a time. In the morning, I had a full hymn." She continues: "My undergraduate degree is in music, and I grew up in a liturgical tradition. Both of those factors highly influenced my experience in and contributions to the Baptist churches I served. I loved teaching the significance of the Christian year in a denomination that traditionally didn't follow it, because it had tremendous impact on people who were intentionally living their faith and hadn't been exposed to Christian seasons outside of Christmas and Easter. The season of Advent holds special importance to me as the anticipation of a new beginning, so I suppose it's no accident my first hymn would be an Advent hymn!"

#### **EUCHARISTIC PRAYER**







#### **POST-COMMUNION CANTICLE**



Marty Haugen used the imagery of various chapters from the books of Isaiah and Matthew for this Advent hymn, written in 1983. These are traditional texts for the Advent season, and Haugen wanted to provide them in a format that was easy for church congregations to sing. Haugen composed this tune for his own text, calling it REJOICE, REJOICE, from the opening words of the last stanza. The hymn has four stanzas; we sing the first and fourth stanzas here. Haugen has published more than 200 pieces of religious music for a variety of settings, including a communion service for Lutheran congregations, Now the Feast and Celebration.

#### **DISMISSAL**

Go in peace. Keep awake.

Thanks be to God.

The text of this hymn is attributed to Ambrose of Milan (340-397). Ambrose, one of the great Latin church fathers, is remembered best for his preaching, his struggle against the Arian heresy, and his introduction of metrical and antiphonal singing into the Western church. When the bishop of Milan, an Arian, died in 374, the people demanded that Ambrose, who was not ordained or even baptized, become the bishop. He was promptly baptized and ordained, and he remained bishop of Milan until his death. Martin Luther's German version dropped one syllable from each line of the Latin text, giving the hymn its characteristically declarative Lutheran form. The hymn is particularly apt for this last Sunday of Advent as it celebrates the wonder of the incarnation, the coming among us of "the Word of God made flesh." The tune, NUN KOMM DER HEIDEN HEILAND, is a chorale derived from a chant.
