Sunday, December 22, 2024 • Fourth Sunday of Advent

Cradle and cross are inextricably connected on the fourth Sunday of Advent. Between a lovely tribute to the little town of Bethlehem and Mary's magnificent song of praise, the letter to the Hebrews reminds us in no uncertain terms that Christ's advent is for "the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all." It is the kind of tension in which the church always lives as when in holy communion—with high delight—"we proclaim the Lord's death."

Jane Parker Huber wrote this thought-provoking text in 1986. Huber emphasized peacemaking, justice, and inclusiveness in her ministry and her hymn texts. She was an active Presbyterian and served on several committees and councils of the Presbyterian Church (USA), including the General Assembly Council and the Committee for a New Hymnbook. This traditional English melody was expanded and arranged by Arthur S. Sullivan for use with the Christmas hymn "It Came upon the Midnight Clear." The tune NOEL is still the primary one sung with that text in England. Sullivan is better remembered for the operas he created in collaboration with W.S. Gilbert, although he did compose a number of hymn tunes and edited The Hymnary (1872) and Church Hymns with Tunes (1874).



READING LUKE 1:26-38

A reading from Luke: the birth of Jesus foretold.

In the sixth month the angel Gabriel was sent by God to a town in Galilee called Nazareth, to a virgin engaged to a man whose name was Joseph, of the house of David. The virgin's name was Mary. And he came to her and said, "Greetings, favored one! The Lord is with you." But she was much perplexed by his words and pondered what sort of greeting this might be. The angel said to her, "Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favor with God. And now, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you will name him Jesus. He will be great and will be called the Son of the Most High, and the Lord God will give to him the throne of his ancestor David. He will reign over the house of Jacob forever, and of his kingdom there will be no end." Mary said to the angel, "How can this be, since I am a virgin?" The angel said to her, "The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you; therefore the child to be born will be holy; he will be called Son of God. And now, your relative Elizabeth in her old age has also conceived a son, and this is the sixth month for her who was said to be barren. For nothing will be impossible with God."Then Mary said, "Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word." Then the angel departed from her.

Here ends the reading.

In this annunciation, Luke makes clear that God comes with good news for ordinary people from little known places. This king will not be born to royalty in a palace, but to common folk in a stall. Here Luke

highlights the role of the

Spirit, a special emphasis

in this gospel.

READING LUKE 1:39-45


Elizabeth, John's mother, and Mary, the mother of Jesus, are two women filled with the Holy Spirit and with faith. In Elizabeth's inspired greeting we hear joy and wonder at these miraculous pregnancies. A reading from Luke: Mary visits Elizabeth.

In those days Mary set out and went with haste to a Judean town in the hill country, where she entered the house of Zechariah and greeted Elizabeth. When Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, the child leaped in her womb. And Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit and exclaimed with a loud cry, "Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb. And why has this happened to me, that the mother of my Lord comes to me? For as soon as I heard the sound of your greeting, the child in my womb leaped for joy. And blessed is she who believed that there would be a fulfillment of what was spoken to her by the Lord."

THE HOMILY PASTOR DOROTHY

HYMN OF THE DAY ELW 258

The assembly stands.

"Uanexpected and Mysterious" was written by Jeannette M. Lindholm in 1996. She wrote this about it: The hymn emphasizes God's love, compassion, and grace made known in incarnation—God's becoming human, Mary's bearing the Christ, Elizabeth's embodying God's compassion in her affirmation of Gabriel's words to Mary, and our living out our own call to embody God's compassion and healing. The hymn also reflects my desire to write hymns that include women and use non-patriarchal language and imagery for God. This tune by Calvin Hampton flows in a most "unexpected and mysterious" way, as if it had been written for this text. Actually the reverse is true. The author of this text wrote it for the tune, which was originally used with "There's a Wideness in God's Mercy" in The Calvin Hampton Hymnary (1980). Hampton was an immensely talented organist and composer. After teaching organ at Salem College School for the Arts in Winston-Salem, North Carolina, in 1963 he went to New York City as director of music at Calvary Church.

Author Ann Bell Worley writes: "God Almighty, We Are Waiting" was my first hymn. It started with the first line in my head during the season of Advent. I remember writing down that first line and keeping a notebook by my bedside that evening, tossing and turning, and writing a line at a time. In the morning, I had a full hymn." She continues: "My undergraduate degree is in music, and I grew up in a liturgical tradition. Both of those factors highly influenced my experience in and contributions to the Baptist churches I served. I loved teaching the significance of the Christian year in a denomination that traditionally didn't follow it, because it had tremendous impact on people who were intentionally living their faith and hadn't been exposed to Christian seasons outside of Christmas and Easter. The season of Advent holds special importance to me as the anticipation of a new beginning, so I suppose it's no accident





This paraphrase of the Magnificat by Rory Cooney has a wild flair about it that cries out the radical nature of this canticle. "Let the king beware," for justice will ultimately bring down every tyrant. Cooney says he "simply wanted to write a setting of the canticle that attempted to capture the revolutionary spirit of the gospel, of a God who 'pulls down the mighty from their thrones and raises up the lowly." Rory Cooney has been Director of Liturgy and Music Ministries at St. Anne Catholic Community in Barrington, Illinois, since 1994. His published compositions span a career of songwriting that began in the early 1970s. This tune, called STAR OF COUNTY DOWN, is the Irish version of KINGSFOLD. Here is what Cooney says about his choice of this tune: As a Catholic musician, I wanted to have the music be accessible to assembly singing and ensemble playing. Irish folk music, with its narrative milieu of longing for freedom and a sort of "bloom where you're planted" joie de vivre in the midst of penury and oppression, seemed to me to be a natural fit. STAR OF COUNTY DOWN, as far as I know, is a quasinationalistic song whose lyrics are about a plot to win over a beautiful girl. The tune is rhythmic and well-known, though, and sung by crowds at rugby matches and the like, so

fit the bill for my needs.






