This text, written by Ruth Duck in 1987, incorporates many of the images associated with the water of baptism, especially nourishment, the calling forth of life, cleansing and renewal, freedom from bondage, and sharing in Christ's resurrection. Duck is an ordained minister in the United Church of Christ, a liturgical theologian, and retired professor of worship who taught for 27 years at Garrett-Evangelical Theological Seminary in Evanston, Illinois. The tune BEACH SPRING was first found in a tunebook called The Sacred Harp (1844). It contained tunes collected from the southern United States.

#### THE SACRAMENT OF HOLY BAPTISM

The assembly is seated.

The baptism liturgy begins as the minister addresses the candidate's parents and sponsors.

The assembly will be invited to join later in the Profession of Faith.

I invite you to profess your faith in Christ Jesus, reject sin, and confess the faith of the church:

Do you renounce the devil and all the forces that defy God? **I renounce them.** 

Do you renounce the powers of this world that rebel against God? **I renounce them.** 

Do you renounce the ways of sin that draw you from God? **I renounce them.** 

Do you believe in God the Father?

I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God?

I believe in Jesus Christ, God's only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven, he is seated at the right hand of the Father, and he will come to judge the living and the dead.

Do you believe in God the Holy Spirit?

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting.

The Lord be with you.

And also with you.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

It is right to give our thanks and praise.

We give you thanks, O God, for in the beginning ....

Sofia, we welcome you into the body of Christ and into the mission we share, giving thanks and praise to God and bearing God's creative and redeeming word to all the world.


Charles Wesley published this Easter hymn in 1739 in 11 stanzas. With his brother John, Wesley was the power behind one of the greatest religious revivals in English history and one of the founders of the Methodist Church. The unknown editor of Lyra Davidica wanted music with more movement and spirit than found in the grave, slowpaced psalm tunes, with one note to a syllable. This tune—EASTER HYMN—was






### Word

READING ACTS 10:34-43

A reading from Acts, the tenth chapter.

Peter crosses the immense religious and social boundary that separates Jews from Gentiles in order to proclaim the good news of Jesus' life, death, and resurrection, so that God's forgiveness in Jesus' name would reach out to all people.

Then Peter began to speak to them: "I truly understand that God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ—he is Lord of all. That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name."

#### **RESPONSORIAL PSALM**

PSALM 118:1-2, 14-24

A reading from Psalm 118.

O give thanks to the Lord, for he is good; his steadfast love endures forever!

#### **READING**

1 CORINTHIANS 15:1-11

The core of the Christian faith and Paul's preaching is the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. As the crucified and risen Christ appeared to the earliest of his followers, so we experience the presence of the Risen One in the preaching of this faith.

A reading from Paul's first letter to the Corinthians, the fifteenth chapter.

Now I would remind you, brothers and sisters, of the good news that I proclaimed to you, which you in turn received, in which also you stand, through which also you are being saved, if you hold firmly to the message that I proclaimed to you—unless you have come to believe in vain. For I handed on to you as of first importance what I in turn had received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures, and that he was buried, and that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the scriptures, and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers and sisters at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have died. Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. Last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared also to me. For I am the least of the apostles, unfit to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God. But by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace toward me has not been in vain. On the contrary, I worked harder than any of them—though it was not I, but the grace of God that is with me. Whether then it was I or they, so we proclaim and so you have come to believe.

But go, tell his disciples and Peter that he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him, just as he told you." So they went out and fled from the tomb, for terror and amazement had seized them; and they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid.





### PREPARE OUR TITHES AND OFFERINGS AND OUR TABLES

#### The assembly stands.

This is a paraphrase of a text written by Thomas Ken in 1674. He wrote many hymns, but is best known for his morning, evening, and midnight hymns, each ending with this doxology. He was a man of conscience and independent mind who did not shirk from confrontations with royalty. In 1688, he refused to read King James II's Declaration of Indulgence in the churches, which granted greater religious freedom in England, and was briefly imprisoned in the Tower of London. Ken's doxology text is set here to the tune LASST UNS ERFREUEN, with alleluias and resurrection proclamations added. Like many other hymn tunes, LASST UNS ERFREUEN is believed to have its roots in a folk song.





#### **POST-COMMUNION CANTICLE**



John of Damascus, an 8thcentury monk and poet, wrote the "Golden Canon for Easter," from which this hymn is derived. John Mason Neale translated the entire canon, but the present hymn is only a portion of it, from Ode I. In Greek churches, the hymn traditionally is sung at a midnight service on Easter Eve as worshipers light candles. Henry Thomas Smart composed the tune I ANCASHIRF in 1836. It is named for the English county in which Smart served as organist.
