Isaac Watts (1674-1748) paraphrased the second half of Psalm 72 as the basis for this hymn. It is a classic example of Watts's practice of adding Christian concepts to psalm texts, yielding a new form of congregational song. As was the practice in his time, only the psalms were sung during worship. Isaac Watts was known as the "father of modern hymnody." The ill health he suffered because of intensive periods of study in his early years gave him more time to write some 600 hymns. John Hatton (c. 1710-1793) was first credited as the composer of this tune in Dixon's Euphonia (1805). The tune is named DUKE STREET, which is where Hatton lived in St. Helen's, England. Hatton's life is mostly a mystery to hymnologists. He was born in Warrington, England, and is believed to have died when accidentally thrown from a stagecoach.

A reading from Daniel, beginning in the tenth chapter.

Stand on your feet, for I have now been sent to you." So while he was speaking this word to me, I stood up trembling. He said to me, "Do not fear, Daniel, for from the first day that you set your mind to gain understanding and to humble yourself before your God, your words have been heard, and I have come because of your words. But the prince of the kingdom of Persia opposed me twenty-one days. So Michael, one of the chief princes, came to help me, and I left him there with the prince of the kingdom of Persia and have come to help you understand what is to happen to your people at the end of days. For there is a further vision for those days.

"At that time Michael, the great prince, the protector of your people, shall arise. There shall be a time of anguish such as has never occurred since nations first came into existence. Many of those who sleep in the dust of the earth shall awake, some to everlasting life and some to shame and everlasting contempt. Those who are wise shall shine like the brightness of the sky, and those who lead the many to righteousness, like the stars forever and ever."

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

This ancient Greek hymn is known as the "Prayer of the Cherubic Hymn" from the liturgy of St. James and was sung while carrying the bread and wine to the communion table. Gerald Moultrie, an Anglican priest, contributed this translation of the Greek liturgical prayer to the second edition of Lyra Eucharistica (1864). Moultrie also translated Latin and German hymns and wrote some original hymn texts. This traditional French carol is named PICARDY for one of the oldest provinces in northern France.

Kendrick, the son of a Baptist minister in Northamptonshire, is one of the most prolific Christian singersongwriters in the United Kingdom. Since releasing his first album in 1972, he has written and recorded more than 450 songs. Kendrick has received honorary doctorates in divinity from Brunel University and Wycliffe College. In 1987 he helped co-found the March for Jesus, which today is a global phenomenon in which Christians take their faith to the streets in a celebration of Christ. In 1995 Kendrick received a Dove Award for his international work.



Henry F. Lyte wrote this hvmn for his congregation in Lower Brixham, Devonshire, Enaland. It is one of many psalm paraphrases he made for that congregation, this one of Psalm 103. Walter Bouman made alterations to the text, employing language that is graciously inclusive. Bouman was ordained in 1956 in the Lutheran Church— Missouri Synod. He later became a pastor in the American Lutheran Church, now part of the ELCA. John Goss composed the tune LAUDA ANIMA, Latin for "Praise my soul," in 1869 for Lyte's hymn beginning with those words. It became one of the most popular of the Victorian tunes in Great Britain and is frequently sung at weddings. Goss, the son of an organist, became one of the greatest organists to serve at St. Paul's Cathedral, London, England, in the 19th century.

Walter Chalmers Smith based the words of this hymn on 1 Timothy 1:17 for his 1867 Hymns of Christ and the Christian Life. A minister of the Free Church of Scotland, Smith served churches in London, Milnathort, Glasgow, and Edinburgh. This hymn's tune, ST. DENIO, was based on an old folk melody traditionally sung with words about a cuckoo. It was modified and first used as a hvmn tune by John Roberts in his Canaidaeth y Cysegr (1839). St. Denio is the Latin form of St. Dennis.
