PROCESSIONAL GOSPEL

LUKE 19:28-40

El Santo Evangelio según Lucas, capítulo diecinueve.

The Holy Gospel according to Luke, the nineteenth chapter.

Glory to you, O Lord. (¡Gloria a ti, oh Señor!)

After he had said this, [Jesus] went on ahead, going up to Jerusalem.

When he had come near Bethphage and Bethany, at the place called the Mount of Olives, he sent two of the disciples, saying, "Go into the village ahead of you, and as you enter it you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden. Untie it and bring it here. If anyone asks you, 'Why are you untying it?' just say this, 'The Lord needs it.' "So those who were sent departed and found it as he had told them. As they were untying the colt, its owners asked them, "Why are you untying the colt?" They said, "The Lord needs it." Then they brought it to Jesus, and after throwing their cloaks on the colt, they set Jesus on it. As he rode along, people kept spreading their cloaks on the road. Now as he was approaching the path down from the Mount of Olives, the whole multitude of the disciples began to praise God joyfully with a loud voice for all the deeds of power that they had seen, saying,

"Blessed is the king who comes in the name of the Lord! Peace in heaven, and glory in the highest heaven!" Some of the Pharisees in the crowd said to him, "Teacher, order your disciples to stop." He answered, "I tell you, if these were silent, the stones would shout out."

Let us go forth in peace, in the name of Christ, singing Hosanna!


A brief silence is kept.

This text was written by Theodulph of Orléans in the 9th century. Brought to France by Charlemagne, Theodulph became bishop of Orléans but was later imprisoned by Charlemagne's successor.

According to legend, he was released when the king, Louis the Pious, heard him sing this hymn from prison. Melchior Teschner composed the tune in 1615. He was a Lutheran pastor.



READING ISAIAH 50:4-9A

A reading from Isaiah, the fiftieth chapter.

The Lord God has given me the tongue of a teacher, that I may know how to sustain the weary with a word. Morning by morning he wakens— wakens my ear to listen as those who are taught. The Lord God has opened my ear, and I was not rebellious, I did not turn backward. I gave my back to those who struck me, and my cheeks to those who pulled out the beard; I did not hide my face from insult and spitting. The Lord God helps me; therefore I have not been disgraced; therefore I have set my face like flint, and I know that I shall not be put to shame; he who vindicates me is near. Who will contend with me? Let us stand up together. Who are my adversaries? Let them confront me. It is the Lord God who helps me; who will declare me guilty?

Word of God. Word of life.

PSALM 31:9-16

A reading from Psalm 31.

Be gracious to me, O Lord, for I am in distress; my eye wastes away from grief, my soul and body also.

For my life is spent with sorrow, and my years with sighing; my strength fails because of my misery, and my bones waste away.

I am the scorn of all my adversaries, a horror to my neighbors, an object of dread to my acquaintances; those who see me in the street flee from me.

I have passed out of mind like one who is dead; I have become like a broken vessel.

This text, the third of the four Servant Songs in Isaiah, speaks of the servant's obedience amid persecution. Though the servant has been variously understood as the prophet himself or a remnant of faithful Israel, Christians have often recognized the figure of Christ in these poems.

For I hear the whispering of many—terror all around!— as they scheme together against me, as they plot to take my life.

But I trust in you, O Lord; I say, "You are my God."

My times are in your hand; deliver me from the hand of my enemies and persecutors.

Let your face shine upon your servant; save me in your steadfast love.

READING PHILIPPIANS 2:5-11

A reading from the letter of Paul to the Philippians, the second chapter.

Paul quotes from an early Christian hymn that describes Jesus' humble obedience in his incarnation as a human being, even to death, and his exaltation and glory as Lord of all.

Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. And being found in human form, he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death— even death on a cross. Therefore God also highly exalted him and gave him the name that is above every name, so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

OFFERTORY HYMN

The assembly stands.

Charlotte Elliott was 45 years old and in ill health when she wrote this hymn, a resolute expression of her understanding of Christ's atonement and its impact on her life. She was born in Clapham, England, and wrote light verse in the early years of her life. After meeting evangelist César Malan of Geneva, Switzerland, she dedicated herself to religious poetry, writing more than 150 hymns. William Batchelder Bradbury wrote and published this tune, WOODWORTH, in his Third Book of Psalmody in 1849. Originally it was used with other words, but when combined with Charlotte Elliott's poem, it became a popular gospel hymn in the United States.



EUCHARISTIC PRAYER


Blessed are you, O God of the universe. Your mercy is everlasting and your faithfulness endures from age to age.

Praise to you for leading your people through the wilderness to the land of milk and honey. Praise to you for the words and deeds of Jesus, your anointed one. Praise to you for the death and resurrection of Christ. Praise to you for your Spirit poured out on all nations.

In the night in which he was betrayed, our Lord Jesus took bread, and gave thanks; broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying: Take and eat; this is my body, given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me.

Again, after supper, he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it for all to drink, saying: This cup is the new covenant in my blood, shed for you and for all people for the forgiveness of sin. Do this for the remembrance of me.

With this bread and cup we remember our Lord's passover from death to life as we proclaim the mystery of faith:



O God of resurrection and new life: Pour out your Holy Spirit on us and on these gifts of bread and wine. Bless this feast. Grace our table with your presence.

Come, Holy Spirit.

Reveal yourself to us in the breaking of the bread. Raise us up as the body of Christ for the world. Breathe new life into us. Send us forth, burning with justice, peace, and love.

Come, Holy Spirit.

With your holy ones of all times and places, with the earth and all its creatures, with sun and moon and stars, we praise you, O God, blessed and holy Trinity, now and forever.



THE LORD'S PRAYER

And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to pray:

Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven. Give us today our daily bread. Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us. Save us from the time of trial and deliver us from evil. For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours, now and forever. Amen.

These evocative stanzas on Christ's Passion come from a 15-stanza hymn by a 17thcentury Hungarian pastor, as translated by the preeminent 20th-century hymnologist of the English-speaking world. Pécselyi Király Imre was a Lutheran or Calvinist pastor in Érsekúivár, a part of Hunaarv that after 1918 became Slovakia with the name Nové Zámky. Hungarian Lutherans and Calvinists both know this text, one of several Imre wrote. Hymnologist Erik Routley served as a Congregational minister, lecturer, and president of the Congregational Church in England and Wales. In 1975 he came to the U.S. as a visiting professor of music at Princeton Theological Seminary and professor of music at Westminster Choir College, both in Princeton, New Jersey. K. Lee Scott composed this fitting tune in 1976 specifically for this hymn. Of his 300 or so publications, he says this "is easily my favorite. The name, SHADES MOUNTAIN, is the beautiful mountain on which I lived for the last 22 years. It is literally the first ripple of the Appalachian mountain chain." Scott has served as a church musician and taught at the University of Alabama at Birmingham and at Samford University.


