#### Sunday, May 19, 2024 • Pentecost

Fifty days after Easter, we celebrate the outpouring of the Holy Spirit on Pentecost. Crossing all boundaries that would separate us, the Spirit brings the wideness of God's mercy to places we least expect it—to a crowd of strangers of different lands and tongues, to dry bones, to our weak hearts. Jesus promises his disciples that they will be accompanied by the Holy Spirit, and that this Spirit reveals the truth. We celebrate that we too have been visited with this same Spirit. Guided by the truth, we come together to celebrate our commitment to the radical hospitality of welcome and inclusion on the anniversary of our Reconciling In Christ affirmation. We are sent from this place to share the good news of God's welcome, inclusion, affirmation, and advocacy to our LGBTQIA+ neighbors, family, and friends—to let the world know that all are truly welcome in this place.

#### Word

**READING** EZEKIEL 37:1-14

A reading from Ezekiel, the thirty-seventh chapter.

The hand of the Lord came upon me, and he brought me out by the spirit of the Lord and set me down in the middle of a valley; it was full of bones. He led me all around them; there were very many lying in the valley, and they were very dry. He said to me, "Mortal, can these bones live?" I answered, "O Lord God, you know." Then he said to me, "Prophesy to these bones, and say to them: O dry bones, hear the word of the Lord. Thus says the Lord God to these bones: I will cause breath to enter you, and you shall live. I will lay sinews on you, and will cause flesh to come upon you, and cover you with skin, and put breath in you, and you shall live; and you shall know that I am the Lord." So I prophesied as I had been commanded; and as I prophesied, suddenly there was a noise, a rattling, and the bones came together, bone to its bone. I looked, and there were sinews on them, and flesh had come upon them, and skin had covered them; but there was no breath in them. Then he said to me, "Prophesy to the breath, prophesy, mortal, and say to the breath: Thus says the Lord God: Come from the four winds, O breath, and breathe upon these slain, that they may live."I prophesied as he commanded me, and the breath came into them, and they lived, and stood on their feet, a vast multitude. Then he said to me, "Mortal, these bones are the whole house of Israel. They say, 'Our bones are dried up, and our hope is lost; we are cut off completely. Therefore prophesy, and say to them, Thus says the Lord God: I am going to open your graves, and bring you up from your graves, O my people; and I will bring you back to the land of Israel. And you shall know that I am the Lord, when I open your graves, and bring you up from your graves, O my people. I will put my spirit within you, and you shall live, and I will place you on your own soil; then you shall know that I, the Lord, have spoken and will act," says the Lord.

The Hebrew word rendered as ruach means "spirit," "wind," or "breath." This reading plays on the different meanings of the word. Just as the dry bones in Ezekiel's vision are given new life, flesh, and breath (or spirit), so God will give the exiles God's own spirit and will bring them home to the land of Israel.

#### **RESPONSORIAL PSALM**

A reading from Psalm 139.

O Lord, you have searched me and known me. You know when I sit down and when I rise up; you discern my thoughts from far away.

You search out my path and my lying down, and are acquainted with all my ways.

Even before a word is on my tongue, O Lord, you know it completely.

You hem me in, behind and before, and lay your hand upon me.

Such knowledge is too wonderful for me; it is so high that I cannot attain it.

Where can I go from your spirit? Or where can I flee from your presence?

If I ascend to heaven, you are there; if I make my bed in Sheol, you are there.

If I take the wings of the morning and settle at the farthest limits of the sea, even there your hand shall lead me, and your right hand shall hold me fast.

For it was you who formed my inward parts; you knit me together in my mother's womb.

I praise you, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made. Wonderful are your works; that I know very well.

My frame was not hidden from you, when I was being made in secret, intricately woven in the depths of the earth.

Search me, O God, and know my heart; test me and know my thoughts.

READING ROMANS 8:22-27

A reading from the letter of Paul to the Romans, the eighth chapter.

We know that the whole creation has been groaning in labor pains until now; and not only the creation, but we ourselves, who have the first fruits of the Spirit, groan inwardly while we wait for adoption, the redemption of our bodies. For in hope we were saved. Now hope that is seen is not hope. For who hopes for what is seen? But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience.

Likewise the Spirit helps us in our weakness; for we do not know how to pray as we ought, but that very Spirit intercedes with sighs too deep for words. And God, who searches the heart, knows what is the mind of the Spirit, because the Spirit intercedes for the saints according to the will of God.

Word of God. Word of life.

Thanks be to God.

By pouring the Holy Spirit into our hearts, God gives us the promised first fruit of eternal life so that we await God's future in hope. In the meantime, the Spirit also intercedes for us by carrying the prayers of our weak human hearts to God.

When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability.

Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven living in Jerusalem. And at this sound the crowd gathered and was bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in the native language of each. Amazed and astonished, they asked, "Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? And how is it that we hear, each of us, in our own native language? Parthians, Medes, Elamites, and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes, Cretans and Arabs—in our own languages we hear them speaking about God's deeds of power." All were amazed and perplexed, saying to one another, "What does this mean?" But others sneered and said, "They are filled with new wine."

But Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed them, "Men of Judea and all who live in Jerusalem, let this be known to you, and listen to what I say. Indeed, these are not drunk, as you suppose, for it is only nine o'clock in the morning. No, this is what was spoken through the prophet Joel: 'In the last days it will be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams. Even upon my slaves, both men and women, in those days I will pour out my Spirit; and they shall prophesy. And I will show portents in the heaven above and signs on the earth below, blood, and fire, and smoky mist. The sun shall be turned to darkness and the moon to blood, before the coming of the Lord's great and glorious day. Then everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved."

Jewish thanksgiving-type festival celebrated seven weeks after Passover. 

THE HOMILY PASTOR DOROTHY

#### The assembly stands.

Hymnwriter Shirley Erena Murray wrote about this hymn: "I wrote this text in 1998, when I was involved with work for Amnesty International and because I couldn't find anything to reflect a broad overview of human rights in any hymnbook. You can see that I have used some of the very basic ideas of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights—the right to shelter, safety, food, and later, the right to a job, freedom of speech, and worship. I've tried to put them in a context which relates directly to the Gospel, but without excluding those who are not of the Christian faith.... But in a more specific way, and to me an authentic one, it relates deeply and immediately to the manifesto of Jesus and all that he taught. What is this table? In my mind it began as the table of the world in the peaceable kingdom, an imaginary place of justice and joy where everyone gathers and is fed. But inevitably it was taken up as a communion hymn, in the context of the Holy Table.... And in places where exclusion by the Church is a source of injustice and pain, as with the gay and lesbian communities, it has been used to ask for a place at the table, along with every other believer." This tune was written in 2006 by Brian Mann.





Holy One, you call us to places we might never imagine—places of forgiveness and grace, places of love and tenderheartedness. And we must step back because our world is so often filled with revenge and judgment, hatred, and hardheartedness, in Israel and Palestine, in the Pentagon, the Congress, and the White House. You call us to imagine a different way. You call us to imagine your way. So enliven our creativity and our imaginations as we lift up our prayers for our world and our nation ... Holy One, remind us you are near. Open our hearts to you.

Holy One, you call us to ways we have tried and too often failed—ways of speaking honestly, ways of putting away wrath and anger and wrangling and slander, ways of being kind to one another. And we must step back because our lives are so often filled with pettiness and greed. In our interactions with immigrants, in our response to the unhoused, in our dealings with those we love, you call us to imagine a different way. You call us to try again at the way you have laid before us. So give us new energy to re-engage one another in the enterprise of your radical community as we lift up our prayers for our state and our spiritual home ... Holy One,

#### remind us you are near. Open our hearts to you.

Holy One, God of imagination and creativity and trying again, lay your hand upon us as we live with HIV/AIDS, with hepatitis, with cancer, with addictions, with MS, with mental illness, with depression, with coming-out issues, with grief and loss, and when we simply need to know that you are near. We pray especially for Gene and Pam, Del and Suzanne, Jean, Amy, Myrna and Jerry, Sandy, Betty, Don, and Gaynelle. Holy One, remind us you are near. Open our hearts to you.

Finally, Holy One, inspire us by the witness of all the saints who have gone before us. Create in us a new spirit, on fire with compassion, welcome, and love for all. Holy One, **remind us you are near. Open our hearts to you.**

Kendrick, the son of a Baptist minister in Northamptonshire, is one of the most prolific Christian singersongwriters in the United Kingdom. Since releasing his first album in 1972, he has written and recorded more than 450 songs. Kendrick has received honorary doctorates in divinity from Brunel University and Wycliffe College. In 1987 he helped co-found the March for Jesus, which today is a global phenomenon in which Christians take their faith to the streets in a celebration of Christ. In 1995 Kendrick received a Dove Award for his international work.





This beautiful Pentecost hymn celebrates God's gift of the Holy Spirit. Written by the Rev. Bryan Jeffery Leech in 1976, the uplifting melody carries the poetry of a true wordsmith. Leech was born in Middlesex, England in 1931. He came to the United States in 1955 and studied at Barrington College and North Park Seminary. He was ordained in 1961 and served in the Covenant Church. He composed more than 500 songs. His tune, LOIS, is named in honor of Lois Bock, wife of Leech's collaborator, publisher, and friend. Fred Bock.

"We Are the Church Alive" was written in 1980 by Metropolitan Community Church pastors Jack Hoggatt-St. John and David Pelletier. The AIDS crisis had barely begun; it was not yet named, there was no treatment. Kittredge Cherry writes, "This powerful hymn was a congregational favorite when I was on the clergy staff of MCC San Francisco in the 1980s. I'll never forget hearing a church full of men with AIDS, back when there was no effective treatment, sing out: 'We are the church alive, our faith has set us free; no more enslaved by quilt and shame, we live our liberty." "The text of this hymn was greatly influenced by the crises of the 1980s. But as you sing it today, note how it is every bit as timely in 2024. May we be the church—the church alive for all eternity!


