What we have, what we bring to Jesus' table, seems like it is not nearly enough to meet all the needs we see around us. But it is not the adequacy of our supplies or our skills that finally makes the difference: it is the power of Jesus working in the littlest and least to transform this world into the world God desires, a world where all the hungry are satisfied.



GATHERING HYMN ELW 461

Sylvia Dunstan, the United Church of Canada minister who wrote this text, was introduced to shape-note tunes at the 1990 Hymn Society conference in Charleston, South Carolina. Afterwards she vacationed with friends nearby and worked out this text while humming this tune as she walked up and down the beach. William Moore is credited as the composer of this tune called HOLY MANNA. It was included in a collection edited in 1825, The Columbian Harmony, as well as in a number of hymnals published in the southern United States during the period of Reconstruction.

Though there is not enough food to go around, Elisha trusts God, who provides enough and even more to satisfy the need. **READING** EPHESIANS 3:14-21

We have been rooted and grounded in the love of Christ, which surpasses all human knowledge. Because Christ dwells in our hearts, our lives are continuously strengthened and empowered by the ongoing presence of the Spirit.

A reading from the letter to the Ephesians, the third chapter.

For this reason I bow my knees before the Father, from whom every family in heaven and on earth takes its name. I pray that, according to the riches of his glory, he may grant that you may be strengthened in your inner being with power through his Spirit, and that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith, as you are being rooted and grounded in love. I pray that you may have the power to comprehend, with all the saints, what is the breadth and length and height and depth, and to know the love of Christ that surpasses knowledge, so that you may be filled with all the fullness of God. Now to him who by the power at work within us is able to accomplish abundantly far more than all we can ask or imagine, to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus to all generations, forever and ever. HOLY GOSPEL JOHN 6:1-21

The Holy Gospel according to John, the sixth chapter.

Glory to you, O Lord. (¡Gloria a ti, oh Señor!)

Jesus went to the other side of the Sea of Galilee, also called the Sea of Tiberias. A large crowd kept following him, because they saw the signs that he was doing for the sick. Jesus went up the mountain and sat down there with his disciples. Now the Passover, the festival of the Jews, was near. When he looked up and saw a large crowd coming toward him, Jesus said to Philip, "Where are we to buy bread for these people to eat?" He said this to test him, for he himself knew what he was going to do. Philip answered him, "Six months' wages would not buy enough bread for each of them to get a little." One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said to him, "There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish. But what are they among so many people?" Jesus said, "Make the people sit down." Now there was a great deal of grass in the place; so they sat down, about five thousand in all. Then Jesus took the loaves, and when he had given thanks, he distributed them to those who were seated; so also the fish, as much as they wanted. When they were satisfied, he told his disciples, "Gather up the fragments left over, so that nothing may be lost." So they gathered them up, and from the fragments of the five barley loaves, left by those who had eaten, they filled twelve baskets. When the people saw the sign that he had done, they began to say, "This is indeed the prophet who is to come into the world."

The assembly stands to greet the Holy Gospel.

In John's gospel, the miracles of Jesus are called "signs," because they reveal the true character of God. As such, they remain within the mystery of God and cannot be brought under human control.

When Jesus realized that they were about to come and take him by force to make him king, he withdrew again to the mountain by himself. When evening came, his disciples went down to the sea, got into a boat, and started across the sea to Capernaum. It was now dark, and Jesus had not yet come to them. The sea became rough because a strong wind was blowing. When they had rowed about three or four miles, they saw Jesus walking on the sea and coming near the boat, and they were terrified. But he said to them, "It is I; do not be afraid." Then they wanted to take him into the boat, and immediately the boat reached the land toward which they were going.

THE HOMILY **PASTOR DOROTHY**

Carolyn Winfrey Gillette is a Presbyterian minister and hvmnwriter. She writes: "Where Is Bread?" was written on the train from Philadelphia to Boston when I was traveling to a hymn conference. This hymn celebrates the only miracle that is found in all four gospels (the feeding of the 5,000: Matthew 14:13-21, Mark 6:32-44, Luke 9:10-17, and John 6:1-15). Jesus meets our physical as well as spiritual needs in his holistic ministry; the church is called to do the same. When Jesus was faced with a crowd of hungry people, he had compassion on them and gave them food to take care of their physical hunger. Jesus, the Bread of Life, cared for the needs of hungry people. We hunger, too, though many of us don't hunger for food. We are over-stuffed with possessions and hunger for Life. I remember working as a summer intern in one community

with absolutely beautiful homes; some of the residents hated to go out at night because they didn't want to leave their very expensive houses behind. There had been a rash or burglaries in their neighborhood that year. They were afraid someone might break in while they were away at a church meeting or a social gathering, so they stayed home. They gave up a sense of community to hold onto the things they owned.

I met another person, a member of a different church, who had been fighting with her family over an inheritance and had not spoken to them for years because of how possessions had been divided. It is easy to become possessed by possessions. Yet the things we own won't satisfy us in the end. We need the Bread of Life.

In the world around us, we hear cries of hunger from the millions of people in our world who don't have enough to eat. When the disciples came to Jesus and said, "The people are hungry," Jesus told them, "You give them something to eat." As Christians obeying the call of Jesus to help our hungry neighbors, we find our richest blessings in reaching out and serving others. "Give us bread and help us share it" is a prayer for others and for us, too.

Cyril Vincent Taylor wrote this tune in the spring of 1941 for the text "Glorious Things of Thee Are Spoken." At the time he was working at the wartime headquarters of the religious broadcasting department of the British Broadcasting Company in ABBOT'S LEIGH, hence the tune's name. Taylor was born in Wigan, Lancashire, England, and following his education was ordained to the Anglican priesthood. He held a number of positions in his career, serving finally as precentor and canon at Salisbury Cathedral from 1969 to 1975.

Graham Kendrick revels here in the feast God provides—with trumpets, welcome, thankful song, lavish good things, love and light, and water turned to wine. Kendrick, the son of a Baptist minister in Northamptonshire, is one of the most prolific Christian singersongwriters in the United Kingdom. Since releasing his first album in 1972, he has written and recorded more than 450 songs. Kendrick has received honorary doctorates in divinity from Brunel University and Wycliffe College. In 1987 he helped co-found the March for Jesus, which today is a global phenomenon in which Christians take their faith to the streets in a celebration of Christ. In 1995 Kendrick received a Dove Award for his international work.





Leech was born in Middlesex. England in 1931. He came to the United States in 1955 and studied at Barrington College and North Park Seminary. He was ordained in 1961 and served in the Covenant Church. He composed more than 500 songs. His tune, LOIS, is named in honor of Lois Bock, wife of Leech's collaborator, publisher, and friend, Fred Bock.
