Jesus tells the parable of the talents, calling us to use our gifts, while we still have time, for the greater and common good. This text is ascribed to St. Patrick (372-466), the second bishop and patron saint of Ireland. It was adapted by James Quinn in 1969. Quinn was a Roman Catholic Jesuit priest who was ordained in 1950. As a consultant for the International Commission on English in the Liturgy, sparked by Vatican II, Quinn exerted influence far beyond his native Scotland. The tune BUNESSAN is a Gaelic melody taken down from a wandering Highland singer by Lachlan MacBean, who published it in Songs and Hymns of the Gael, 1888, as a setting for Mary Macdonald's carol "Child in the Manger." The tune is named after Macdonald's birthplace on the Isle of Mull, Scotland. BUNESSAN is also well known as the setting for Eleanor Farjeon's "Morning Has Broken."



READING

ZEPHANIAH 1:7, 12-18

Zephaniah presents the day of the Lord as one of judgment and wrath. Descriptions of the last day in the New Testament include details taken from Old Testament accounts of the day of the Lord. A reading from Zephaniah, the first chapter.

Be silent before the Lord God! For the day of the Lord is at hand; the Lord has prepared a sacrifice, he has consecrated his guests. At that time I will search Jerusalem with lamps, and I will punish the people who rest complacently on their dregs, those who say in their hearts, "The Lord will not do good, nor will he do harm." Their wealth shall be plundered, and their houses laid waste. Though they build houses, they shall not inhabit them; though they plant vineyards, they shall not drink wine from them.

The great day of the Lord is near, near and hastening fast; the sound of the day of the Lord is bitter, the warrior cries aloud there. That day will be a day of wrath, a day of distress and anguish, a day of ruin and devastation, a day of darkness and gloom, a day of clouds and thick darkness, a day of trumpet blast and battle cry against the fortified cities and against the lofty battlements. I will bring such distress upon people that they shall walk like the blind; because they have sinned against the Lord, their blood shall be poured out like dust, and their flesh like dung. Neither their silver nor their gold will be able to save them on the day of the Lord's wrath; in the fire of his passion the whole earth shall be consumed; for a full, a terrible end he will make of all the inhabitants of the earth.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM

PSALM 90:1-12

A reading from Psalm 90.

Lord, you have been our dwelling place in all generations. Before the mountains were brought forth, or ever you had formed the earth and the world, from everlasting to everlasting you are God.

You turn us back to dust, and say, "Turn back, you mortals." For a thousand years in your sight are like yesterday when it is past, or like a watch in the night.

You sweep them away; they are like a dream, like grass that is renewed in the morning; in the morning it flourishes and is renewed; in the evening it fades and withers. For we are consumed by your anger; by your wrath we are overwhelmed.

You have set our iniquities before you, our secret sins in the light of your countenance. For all our days pass away under your wrath; our years come to an end like a sigh.

The days of our life are seventy years, or perhaps eighty, if we are strong; even then their span is only toil and trouble; they are soon gone, and we fly away.

Who considers the power of your anger? Your wrath is as great as the fear that is due you. So teach us to count our days that we may gain a wise heart.

READING

1 THESSALONIANS 5:1-11

Though we do not know and cannot calculate the day of Christ's return, we live faithfully in the here and now as we anticipate the day when we will be given eternal salvation through our Lord Jesus Christ.

A reading from the First Letter to the Thessalonians, the fourth chapter.

Now concerning the times and the seasons, brothers and sisters, you do not need to have anything written to you. For you yourselves know very well that the day of the Lord will come like a thief in the night. When they say, "There is peace and security," then sudden destruction will come upon them, as labor pains come upon a pregnant woman, and there will be no escape! But you, beloved, are not in darkness, for that day to surprise you like a thief; for you are all children of light and children of the day; we are not of the night or of darkness.

So then let us not fall asleep as others do, but let us keep awake and be sober; for those who sleep sleep at night, and those who are drunk get drunk at night. But since we belong to the day, let us be sober, and put on the breastplate of faith and love, and for a helmet the hope of salvation. For God has destined us not for wrath but for obtaining salvation through our Lord Jesus Christ, who died for us, so that whether we are awake or asleep we may live with him.

Therefore encourage one another and build up each other, as indeed you are doing.

As for this worthless slave, throw him into the outer darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth."





Frederik Herman Kaan wrote this text in 1975 to fit this music. The combination was first sung together at the World Council of Churches Assembly in Nairobi, Africa, in 1975. Kaan was born in Haarlem, Holland, and endured as a youth the Nazi occupation of his native country. His father was a member of the Dutch Resistance; his family hid a Jew and a political prisoner in their home: and three of his grandparents starved to death during this time. Doreen Potter adapted this Jamaican folk song, now called LINSTEAD. The music of the Caribbean islands is not often associated with hymn tunes. Yet the religious heritage of these islands is rich, having been influenced by the Europeans of various nations who claimed and settled these islands and by individuals who worked

there as slaves.





SENDING BLESSING

SENDING HYMN ELW 632

Isaac Watts based this hymn on Psalm 90. He wrote it in 1714, at a time when Queen Anne was near death and all of England was anxious about her successor. Many feared that England would be divided by civil strife upon her death. This is undoubtedly Watts's greatest hymn. Long considered the father of modern English hymnody, Watts wrote more than 600 hymns and paraphrases. William Croft is thought to have written the tune ST. ANNE while he was organist at St. Anne's Church in Soho, London, England. St. Anne was the mother of the Virgin Mary, the mother of Jesus. This tune was not used with these words by Watts until 1861. Croft was born in Ettington, England, in 1678, and served as organist at Westminster Abbey. He was buried there following his death in 1727.
